Here's our expert advice about cashing in on your closet:

THE CLEVER GIRL'S GUIDE TO USING EBAY

Got to eBay.co.uk and create a seller's account by clicking on the 'sell' tab. Fill in your details and pick a memorable user ID.

Enter your credit or debt card details for verification. You won't be charged!

Sellers and buyers rate their experience on a user feedback system. As Sophie's a new seller with no feedback, buyers might be reluctant to make purchases. So it's worth Sophie making a couple of small purchases (of other things) to get positive feedback.

Take eye-catching photos of your item from different angles. The first photo is free and each additional picture is 12p.

> Keep your description informative including brand and size, stating any flaws. for free listings weekends where

Entice buyers. For example, say the pink dress is perfect for summer.

Choose whether to put your item in the standard auction or 'buy it now' sale.

anything to eBay Opt for a low starting price to result in a high final price. If you start under 99p, it's free. Use a reserve price if you don't want to sell too low.

> Don't exaggerate postage costs or you'll put buyers off! Check post office fees before you list an item.

> Pay a fee to eBay when your item is sold. This is 10 per cent of the final price up to a maximum of £75. If your item doesn't sell, you don't pay.

Set up a PayPal account so you can accept card payments over the internet fast and securely. PayPal will take a fee.

Encourage good feedback by laundering, ironing and packaging your item well and posting promptly.

Other ways to sell unwanted clothes

Make quick cash by visiting musicmagpie.com. Simply key in brand and garment type to get an offer price. Postage is also free. Flog vintage fashion using asos.com marketplace. There is no listing fee, instead you pay a 10 per cent sales commission.

Sell second-hand designer clothes at clothesagency.com which charges £1.25 per item for a 28-day listing. Use Facebook selling groups. Ask friends to invite you to their local group and sell stuff for free. Buyers should live near you, so you can drop items round.
