1. TRAVEL SECTION

The Routes That No Longer Exist

HOOK: The Little family drove through Afghanistan, crossed the Khyber Pass, and traversed Iran in 1977. These routes – once the legendary 'hippie trail' – are now closed due to geopolitical conflict. This book serves as a time capsule of travel freedom that may never return.
