Margaret lived mostly in Highgate, North London, where she was known for her love of dachshunds, often owning two or three at a time. Her favourite pastime was taking long walks in the countryside, particularly on Hampstead Heath.

After retiring from modeling, Margaret moved to the other side of the camera lens and became an accomplished nature photographer. She won a national photography competition with her images of flowers, earning the prize of having her photographs listed with Getty Images, where they remain to this day.

On retiring, she returned to Gloucestershire, reconnecting with her wartime foster sister Barbara. She later lived in Tring, Hertfordshire, and finally moved to Bury St Edmunds in 2012.

Margaret completed Pretty from the Outside as her debut memoir and final testament. She passed away in September 2024, leaving behind this remarkable account of her life and times.
